July 8, 2014

Medical calls have been at their normal volume but are often clustered over a several day period. There have been no fire calls for structures, motor vehicle accidents or wild-land scenarios since my last report.

Local education is on going to promote residents to acquire fire permits and to be aware of the significance of a flashing green light in their community.

We have investigated one complaint of potentially contaminated wood being burnt for home heating. A sample of the wood in question has been taken to the appropriate government agency to determine if any hazard existed. The wood in question is not being used as heating fuel or camp fire fuel at this point in time. If the wood is contaminated the fire department will ensure the wood in question will not be used as a fuel in the future. We will also attempt to educate our township residents that this type of wood is unsuitable for a fuel source.

At the Algoma Mutual Aid meeting I accepted the position of Vice President of the District of Algoma Mutual Aid Association. This is a two year term. My goal is to become better informed of our commitment to the regional fire service as well as the capabilities that can be provided to our township if the need arises.

MARSHALL DRIVE--good condition

NORTH GROS CAP ROAD--the road was graded on May 27th.--requires gravel

HEYWOOD DRIVE--good condition. Will be graded as time permits

MOUNTAINVIEW DRIVE--some potholes have been repaired. Road is in fair condition.

DEANS ROAD--good condition.

WALLS ROAD--good condition. potholes have been repaired

GAGNON ROAD-- bumps from frost heaves have settled and have been patched

TOWN LINE--potholes have been repaired and road is being monitored and repaired as weather permits. Construction to start soon on south bridge.

PRINCE LAKE ROAD--is in need of repair. Gravel is required for road. Guardrails need repair on the paved hills. Shoulders are washing out in the guardrail areas and are in need of added materials. Between the two paved hills there are 2 cross culverts that need to be replaced . There is a frost boil on the hill before the swamp has been repaired .-- work is in progress to repair all of these

PRINCE LAKE ROAD NORTH-- is in need of gravel. Grading has been done

HILL ROAD--is in need of gravel. Grading has been done. The paved hill requires extensive work to repair rocks coming through the surface. Am working on the cost of these repairs and will discuss. 2 culverts have to be lowered before gravel can be applied

CREEK ROAD-- township has purchase 2 culverts and land owner has been notified, and he will install them.

Road side grass cutting and weed whipping will start shortly. The brushing was to start in July but have notified by the contractor that this will take place in September.

Subject: Trans Canada Trails / Lake Superior Water Trail	

Councillor Yanni and I attended a meeting at Batchewana Bay on Friday, June 27, 2014.

Melissa Pomeroy of TCT and Joannie McGuffin of LSWT gave a presentation on their respective projects.

Most of what was discussed was the subject that Joannie covered when she presented at the council meeting previously. However, one of the most interesting things we found out, and the reason for the letter of support that is presented in your packages, is a funding opportunity. There is a package in the office with maps and some concept ideas for the two groups.

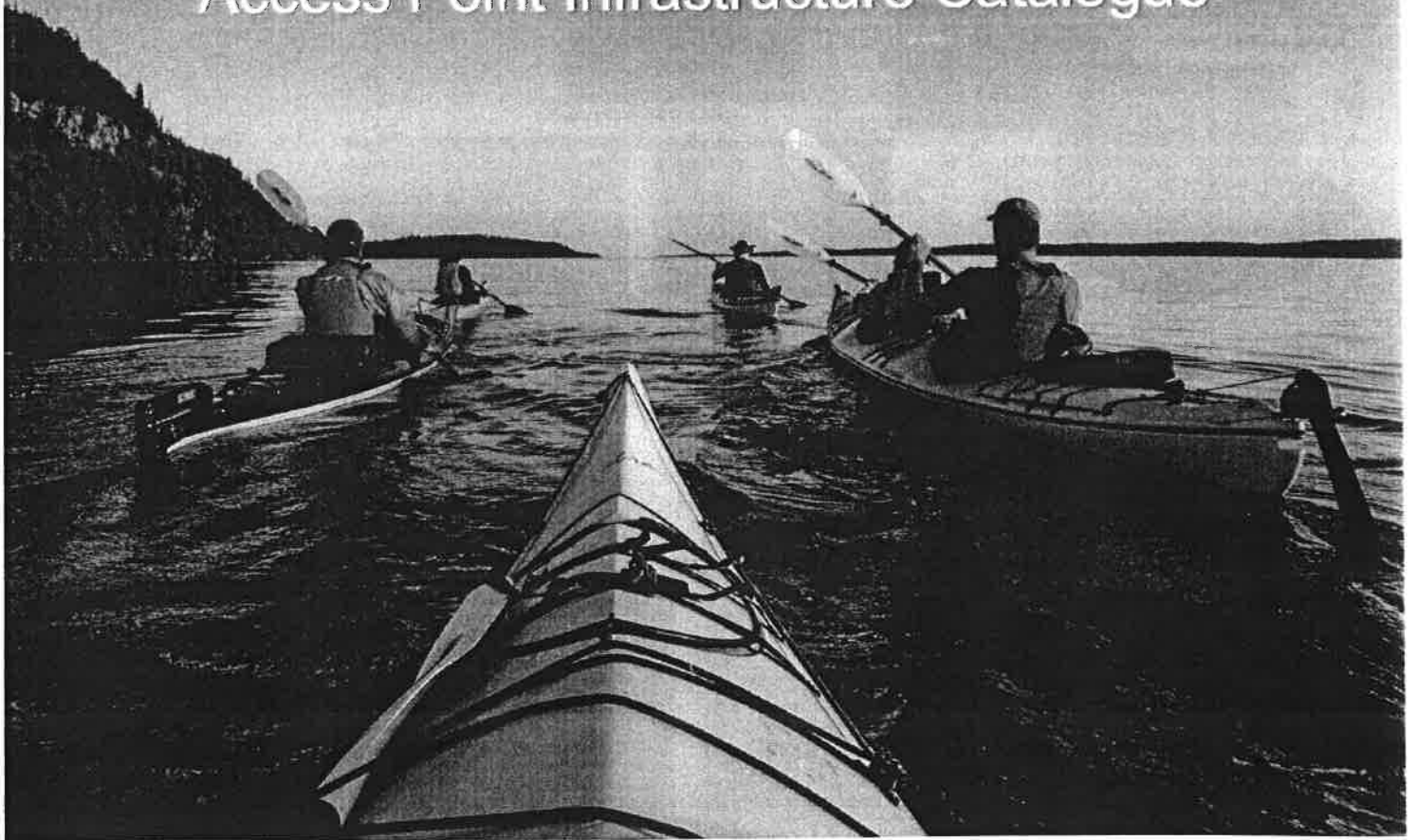
There is a possibility for up to 90% funding for some amenities at the Gros Cap Marina Park. I asked if the fact that council has decided not to manage the marina would impact this and was told that they are not planning on using the marina at all. Launching would be for canoes and kayaks only, and would be accommodated from the beach area in front of the park.

Some amenities that would be eligible for funding would be 'Clivus Multrum' toilets (very low maintenance), picnic tables, bear-wise garbage receptacles and possibly a module storage unit for people to lock their canoes or kayaks safely away if they want to tour the area.

The letter that they are asking council to support is for the trail itself and does not obligate council in any way.

CORPORATION OF THE TOWNSHIP OF PRINCE

By-Law No. 2014-

Being a by-law to regulate the discharge
of firearms within the Township of Prince.

The Council of the Corporation of the Township of Prince, pursuant to *section 119 of The Municipal Act, 2001*, ENACTS as follows:

Interpretation

1. For the purposes of this By-law, the following terms shall have the corresponding meanings:
 - (a) **By-law** means this By-Law and any amendments thereto including any and all schedules forming any part of this By-law and any amendments thereto;
 - (b) **Firearm** means any gun or other firearm, air-gun, pellet gun, spring-gun, shotgun, cross-bow, long-bow, and any other barrelled weapon from which any shot, bullet, missile or other projectile may be discharged.

Firearm Discharge Prohibited

2. No person shall discharge any Firearm in the Township of Prince within 450 metres of:
 - a) any dwelling, other than a dwelling on the property upon which the lawful discharge occurs; or
 - b) any public park or public open space; or
 - c) any road allowances.

Firearm Discharge Permitted

3. A person may discharge a Firearm in the Township of Prince only when:
 - (i) Such person is exercising his or her rights under the *Livestock, Poultry and Honey Bee Protection Act, R.S.O. 1990, Chapter L. 24.* and *Fish and Wildlife Conservation Act, S.O. 1997, c. 41*, or any successor thereof, and such person exercises due care for the safety of persons and property in such exercise;
 - (ii) Such person is discharging the Firearm in the course of his or her duties as a police officer or an employee of the Federal or Provincial Government.
 - (iii) Such person is the owner of property or a person authorized by the owner of property within the Township of Prince and such person discharges the Firearm on such owned property for the purpose of either protecting the owner's agricultural crops or destroying any animal or pest that the property owner reasonably believes is of imminent harm to any person or to the owner's livestock, poultry or pets.
 - (iv) Such person is discharging a firearm for the purpose of practice or sighting a firearm on private property with permission of the property owner, provided it meets the setbacks in Section 2 and such practice will be kept to a reasonable length of time, and held only between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 9:00 p.m. on the same day.

- (v) Such person is involved in the activity of hunting on private property with permission of the property owner, provided it meets the setbacks in Section 2.

Offence

4. Every person who contravenes any provision of this By-law is guilty of an offence.

Penalty

5. Every person who is convicted of an offence under any provision of this By-law shall be liable to a penalty as set out in Section 61 of the *Provincial Offences Act, R.S.O. 1990, Chapter P. 33*, or any successor thereof.

Prior By-laws Repealed

6. By-law No. 296 is hereby repealed.

BEING A BY-LAW TO ADOPT THE ELECTION SIGNS POLICY. THIS POLICY WILL REGULATE THE PLACEMENT OF ELECTION SIGNS WITHIN CERTAIN ROAD ALLOWANCES AND ANY OTHER PROPERTY OWNED AND OPERATED BY THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWNSHIP OF PRINCE.

WHEREAS Section 11(1) of the Municipal Act, S.O. 2001, as amended, states that the municipality may pass by-laws respecting structures, including fences and signs;

AND WHEREAS Section 99(1) of the Municipal Act, S.O. 2001, as amended, states that the municipality shall give notice of its intention to pass the by-law;

AND WHEREAS Council has determined that, for the purpose of aesthetics and public safety, it wishes to prohibit the placement of election signs on, over, in or under any public highway, road allowance, sidewalk, bridge or other Township of Prince property Under its jurisdiction;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ENACTED as a by-law of the Corporation of the Township of Prince, the ELECTION SIGN POLICY; and

FURTHER, that Schedule 'A', being the ELECTION SIGN POLICY, forms part of this by-law.

**THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWNSHIP OF PRINCE
POLICIES AND PROCEDURES**

POLICY NAME: ELECTION SIGN POLICY DATED: June 2014
DEPARTMENT: ADMINISTRATION – ELECTIONS POLICY NO: EL-01

SCOPE

This Election Sign Policy is being provided in order to ensure public safety on highways during an election period, and to protect the rights of property owners.

Election Signs shall be a self supporting sign or advertising device including, but not limited to posters, placards, bulletins, banners, notices, pictures or any combination thereof which advertises or promotes a candidate in a municipal, provincial or federal election or by-election.

The Township of Prince reserves the right to erect, place or display signs or advertising devices which provide information concerning the election or any part of an election process.

Any Election Sign erected or installed in contravention of this policy may be removed by an employee of the Township of Prince under the direction of the Clerk. The candidate may be liable for the cost of removing the signs and any related costs.

It is a criminal offence to remove, deface or wilfully damage a **lawfully erected** Election Sign.

PLACEMENT OF ELECTION SIGNS

In accordance with Sec. 48(2) of the *Municipal Elections Act*, no person shall:

- a. Place an Election Sign, or cause an Election Sign to be placed on any premises used as a voting place for elections, or on any Highway adjacent to the voting place; or
- b. Place or cause to be placed in or on a vehicle that is parked on any premises used as a voting place for elections an Election Sign that is visible from outside the vehicle.

Election Signs shall not be located, erected or displayed:

- a. On any building or structure, any sidewalk, park or open space owned or operated by the Township;
- b. Which obstructs, impairs, impedes or hinders the movement or sight lines of vehicular or pedestrian traffic or the visibility of warning devices and traffic signs, including day-lighting triangles at intersections;
- c. On any utility pole or box, traffic sign or commercial sign, planter, bench, bridge, light standard, waste receptacle, mail box, or legally placed structure on any Highway;
- d. On any post, pole or support already containing an official or authorized highway sign erected by the Township or the Province of Ontario.

Election Signs shall not:

- a. Display the Township logo or symbol;
- b. Simulate any traffic sign or signal that directs the movement of traffic, nor interfere with, mislead or confuse traffic by using such words as "stop", "one way", or "danger";
- c. Be painted on, attached to, or supported by a tree, stone or other natural object;
- d. Be erected or placed so as to obstruct, impede or interfere with any fire hydrant, fire escape, fire exit, door, window, or any means of access to any building by fire fighters or emergency personnel;
- e. Impede, hinder or prevent vehicular traffic or parking on private or public lands, or on a Highway; or
- f. Have flashing lights or be illuminated;
- g. Be mounted on a trailer or other freestanding structure to facilitate its movement from place to place.

PLACEMENT AND REMOVAL OF ELECTION SIGNS

- a. All Election Signs shall be removed no later than five (5) days following Election Day. The Candidate shall be responsible for the removal of his or her Election Signs within the prescribed time frame, and may be liable for the cost of having the signs removed.

- b. Election Signs may only be placed on a Highway adjacent to a residential property with the consent of the owner or occupant of the adjacent residential property.
- c. Election Signs relating to a Municipal Election shall not be erected or displayed more than 45 days before the Municipal Election (Nomination Day).
- d. Election Signs relating to a federal or provincial election shall not be erected or displayed until the day that the writ of election is issued.

DEFINITIONS

- a. "Highway" shall have the same meaning as in the *Highway Traffic Act, R.S.O. 1990 c.H.8*, as amended.
- b. "Public Property" means property owned by or under the control of the Township or any of its agencies, boards or commissions, including Highways under the jurisdiction of the Province.

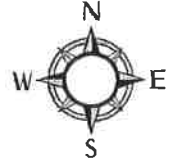

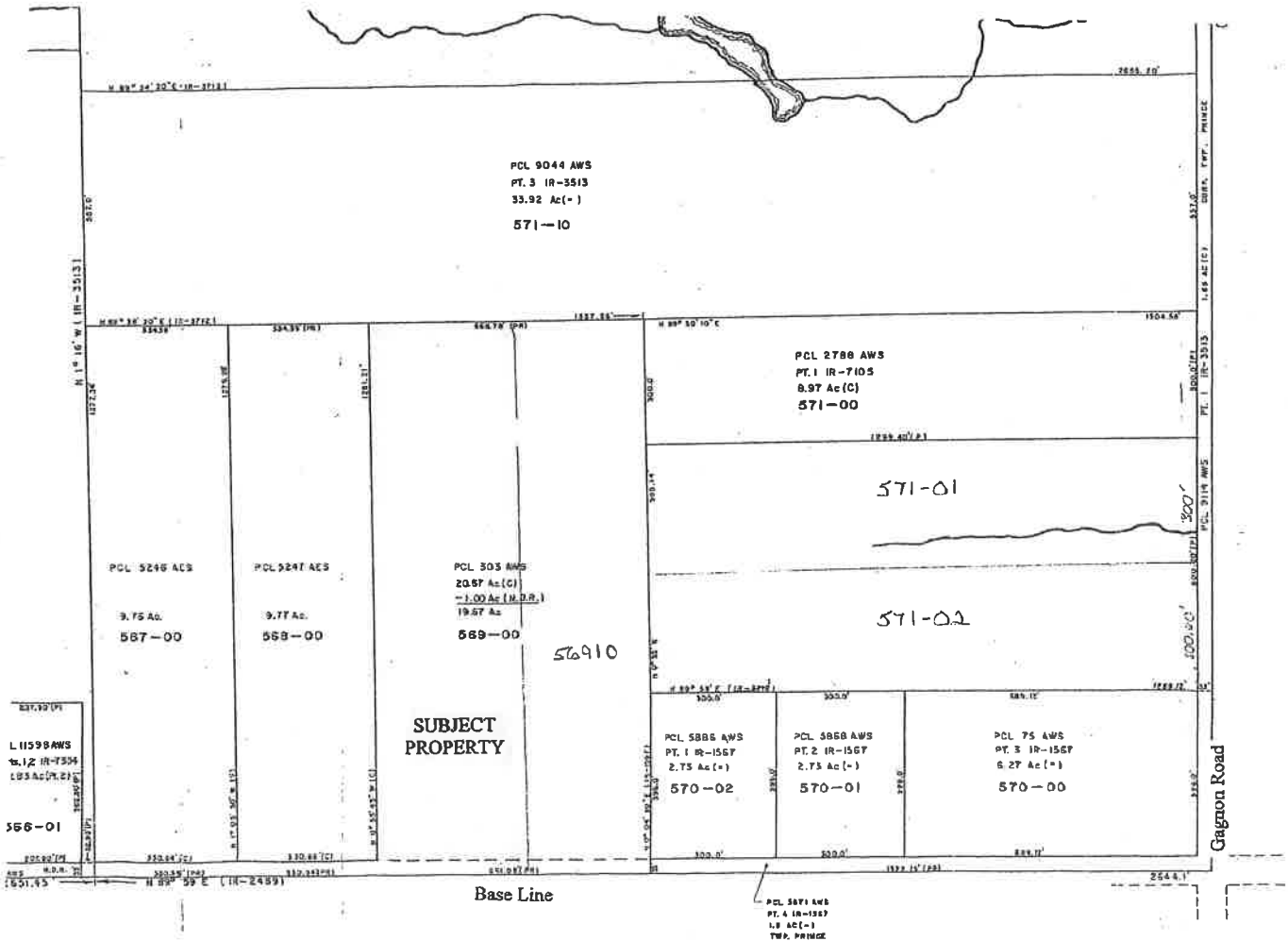

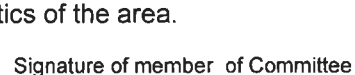

AND IN THE MATTER OF an Application by Union Gas Limited, pursuant to section 36(1) of the *Ontario Energy Board Act, 1998*, for an order or orders necessary to accommodate a new interruptible natural gas liquefaction service at its Hagar Liquefied Natural Gas facility.

APPLICATION

1. Union Gas Limited (“Union”) is a business corporation, incorporated under the laws of Ontario, with its head office in the Municipality of Chatham-Kent.
2. Union conducts an integrated natural gas utility business that combines the operations of selling, distributing, transmitting and storing gas within the meaning of the *Ontario Energy Board Act, 1998* (the “Act”).
3. Union hereby applies to the Ontario Energy Board (“Board”), pursuant to section 36(1) of the *Ontario Energy Board Act, 1998* (the “Act”) for an order or orders approving a new interruptible natural gas liquefaction service. The service will be provided at Union’s Liquefied Natural Gas (“LNG”) facility Hagar, Ontario using liquefaction capacity that is excess to utility requirements.
4. This service is in direct response to an increased interest in the use of natural gas, and LNG particularly, as an economical and environmentally preferable fuel for heavy duty vehicles.

5. The service will allow Union, with the new facilities that it will construct adjacent to Hagar, to dispense LNG to LNG wholesalers or customers primarily for vehicle transportation fuel. Union plans to offer this service beginning September 1, 2015.
6. The service will result in better utilization of Hagar. This better utilization will benefit Union's ratepayers over the Incentive Regulation Mechanism ("IRM") term (2014-2018) by contributing to regulated earnings subject to sharing. On rebasing, the revenue from these services will form part of regulated revenue for ratemaking.
7. Specifically, Union applies to the Board for:
 - (i) an order approving the proposed cost allocation methodology used to allocate 2013 Board-approved costs between liquefaction, storage and vapourization functions performed at Hagar;
 - (ii) an order approving the proposed cost allocation methodology that allocates 2013 Board-approved Union North distribution costs to the Rate L1 service;
 - (iii) an order approving a new Rate L1 rate schedule and a cost-based rate to accommodate an interruptible liquefaction service at Hagar;
 - (iv) an order approving a maximum interruptible liquefaction rate on short-term (i.e. one year or less) liquefaction service equal to approximately three times the cost-based interruptible liquefaction rate;
 - (v) an order approving modifications to the Union North Schedule "A" to accommodate Rate L1 gas supply charges expressed in dollars per gigajoules (\$/GJ);
 - (vi) for such interim order or orders approving interim rates or other charges and accounting orders as may from time to time appear appropriate or necessary; and
 - (vii) all necessary orders and directions concerning pre-hearing and hearing procedures for the determination of this application.
8. This application will be supported by written evidence. This evidence will be pre-filed and will be amended from time to time as required by the Board, or as circumstances may require.

9. The persons affected by this application are the customers resident or located in the Municipalities, Police Villages and First Nations served by Union, together with those to whom Union sells gas, or on whose behalf Union distributes, transmits or stores gas. It is impractical to set out in this application the names and addresses of such persons because they are too numerous.
