Tuesday February 9, 2016

The fire department budget for 2016 will be submitted this week to council for their consideration.

Medical calls remain consistent. We have had no fire occurrences or motor vehicle accidents since my last report.

This month an amendment to Appendix C - By-law 2016-02 will be introduced. This amendment will clarify the role of Prince Fire when attending a motor vehicle accident. The Fire Department does not have hydraulic extrication equipment but relies on mutual aid from Sault Fire to provide this service if required. However most motor vehicle accidents do not require hydraulics to initiate medical attention or to extricate a victim from a vehicle. Basic vehicle stabilization and the use of hand tools are all that is needed to perform this task safely and in a timely fashion. Limiting our response to motor vehicle accidents just because we do not carry hydraulics does not make sense or reflect our current practices

Training continues.

All roads are in fairly good condition.

Work on all 4 bridges are now complete. Peggy was informed that there will be a reconciliation of the account and there could be one more invoice coming.

As you know, the inspection on Gagnon Road is completed. Page 4 of the report (attached) has some urgent issues that should be done this year. Some of the deterioration will be slowed down significantly if the rebar is cleaned and the repairs to the concrete are completed. The guiderails and signage are safety issues and must be done this year. We do have some guiderails behind the Quonset hut that may be used and will help reduce the cost somewhat.

Letters will be left at residents' homes or in their mailboxes when we notice them pushing snow across the roads and/or into the ditches, or pushing snow onto the roads and leaving it there.

The Mayor has suggested that we look into hiring a handyman for jobs that need to be done around the municipal buildings.

In the past we have asked the Road Superintendent, Roads Labourer or custodian to do the jobs. If they don't feel they have the time or the ability for the task, we have called someone in, on an as needed basis. This has been very sporadic.

Often when we have called a resident to do the work they have not charged even though we have asked for an invoice.

I have considered expanding the job description for the 3 positions, above, to include minor repairs and miscellaneous maintenance projects to municipal structures, as needed. However, these positions do not currently have that criteria in the job description and may or may not have the expertise.

Council, should they decide to hire, will follow the protocol in the HR manual Section 3. However, before advertising, I would need to know what pay rate we will be using, and if you feel that the job description would fit into a comparable job class in our existing scale.







Union's application will be put on hold until the completion of the generic hearing. The OEB will be issuing a broad notice in relation to the generic hearing in due course. We were greatly disappointed when we were informed this morning that the community expansion project, under the above named application, has been put on hold by the Ontario Energy Board.

Prince Township has been advocating for this development and the installation of natural gas lines in our municipality for several years now and were very hopeful that there would be a positive outcome in this hearing. The Township has already filed a letter of support to the Board in relation to this proceeding.

In addition, the township supported a resolution from the Municipality of West Nipissing, asking the Minister of Energy to consider expanding the accessibility to natural gas services in Northern Ontario communities in order to provide a similar financial saving opportunity to all northern residents and businesses that is available to Southern Ontario and larger municipalities in Northern Ontario.

The Township office has been holding off on the purchase of a new furnace for a few years now, with the intention of converting to natural gas. This switch would be more cost efficient and environmentally friendly than our oil-fueled boiler. We have also sent out surveys and have a commitment from many members of our community who are anxious to convert to natural gas, as well.

Many of our residents have been informed by their insurance companies that the oil tanks they are currently using, are no longer acceptable and must be changed. The cost for this replacement is approximately \$3,500 per tank. This expense could be avoided if the natural gas service is made available sooner rather than later.

On behalf of the Township of Prince, I implore you to take whatever steps necessary to expedite this process and approve the expansion of natural gas in Prince Township.

The City of Sault Ste. Marie continues to move forward with its Waste Management Environmental Assessment (EA). We last contacted you in February, 2012. To date, a considerable level of study has been completed in developing and assessing the preferred approach to managing waste in the City of Sault Ste. Marie. The work completed to date has resulted in the following observations:

- The preferred approach to managing waste in the future is through increased waste diversion (ie. 3R's - reduction, reuse and recycling) and landfilling any remaining residual waste.
- The preferred approach to landfilling residual waste is an expansion of the existing City • owned and operated disposal site located at 402 Fifth Line East in the City of Sault Ste. Marie.
- The preferred expansion option incorporates a moderate increase in the height or elevation of • the waste and an expansion of the disposal footprint to the north and west of the existing footprint. The preferred option also includes landfill mining within the western portion of the existing disposal footprint to enhance groundwater protection. This process involves excavating existing disposed waste and cover material, recovering earthen material or "fines" and returning the waste to the disposal footprint. All mined and expansion areas will include the construction of a liner beneath the waste to collect leachate (precipitation contaminated as it filters through waste) and direct it to the City's sewage treatment plant for treatment. The existing disposal footprint and proposed mining and expansion areas are highlighted in a figure in the attached Newsletter.

We have now completed a detailed impact assessment for the preferred expansion option. The detailed impact assessment is a focussed investigation and analysis to identify potential environmental impacts resulting from the construction or operational changes associated with the proposed expansion. The impact assessment also considered opportunities for enhanced mitigation that otherwise would not likely be implemented in the absence of the proposed expansion.



Eleven reports were prepared which included expertise in the following disciplines:

- Biology (terrestrial and aquatic)
- Geotechnical
- Groundwater
- Atmospheric (acoustic and air quality)
- Surface water

- Socio-economic
- Visual
- Traffic
- Archaeological/Cultural
- Planned land use

We are now seeking input from Government agencies, stakeholders, First Nations and the general public regarding the impact assessment work. We would like to obtain as much input as possible from your residents. We will be conducting a public open house in Sault Ste. Marie as outlined below. Everyone is welcome to attend. We have attached a Notice of the Public Input Session which can be printed or copied and posted in prominent locations that are typically accessed by your residents. In addition, we encourage you to post the Notice on your website.

You are also encouraged to view the **Project Newsletter**, and the February 9th **Public Open House displays**. Copies of these documents are attached for your information and reference. These documents are also available electronically on the City's website at <u>saultstemarie.ca/SolidWasteEA</u>.





ENVIRONMENTAL ASSESSMENT (EA) PROCESS

The City of Sault Ste. Marie is undertaking an Environmental Assessment (EA) Study to determine the preferred method for managing its municipal solid waste. The EA Process is a transparent decision-making process used to promote good environmental planning by assessing potential effects of certain activities or projects on the natural and human environment. There are several phases and tasks involved in completing an EA as outlined in the graphic below.



The City is finalizing Phase 2 of the EA Process and is currently preparing the EA submission. We are interested in obtaining your input related to the current activities.

BACKGROUND

Phase 1 of the EA process included public consultation and culminated with the Ministry of Environment and Climate Change's (MOECC) approval of the project Terms of Reference (ToR) in 2005. The ToR provides a framework or roadmap for completing the EA and summarizes the tasks and activities to be undertaken by the proponent.

Workshops and an Open House were held in the late spring of 2007 to present the waste management alternatives being considered. The input received was incorporated into the evaluation and the preferred waste management alternative was identified as increased waste diversion through reduction, reuse and recycling (i.e. 3Rs) and landfilling of the residual waste. The preferred alternative was presented at an Open House in June, 2010.

The study noted that landfills can be designed and operated to comply with regulations and policies, landfill gas can be collected and flared or recovered to generate electricity, landfills can manage the residual waste stream, landfills are flexible to changes in waste quality and quantities and landfilling is cost effective.

The City remains committed to investigating, implementing and supporting programs to increase waste diversion through 3Rs initiatives. Since the implementation of 3Rs initiatives does not require EA Act approval, the EA study turned its focus to alternative methods of landfilling residual waste. The key objective of this phase of the study is to find an environmentally suitable location for the development of additional landfill capacity.

The first step in this phase consisted of completing a non-site specific evaluation of developing a new landfill versus expanding an existing landfill. To identify a preferred approach to landfilling waste, the alternatives were compared using the following seven criteria groups:



A Public Input Session was held in April, 2011 to present the landfill alternatives being considered. The evaluation and response from consultation concluded that an expansion of an existing landfill is generally preferred over construction of a new site.

The study noted that an expansion requires less land, displaces fewer people and/or social/natural features, disrupts fewer people (i.e., one site versus two sites creating nuisance impacts), costs less, typically encounters fewer challenges in gaining technical approvals, and reduces the number of facilities the City must manage.

The second step in the Alternative Methods task focused on the best approach to expand the City's existing landfill site at 402 Fifth Line East by identifying and comparatively evaluating site expansion alternatives. Options considered included horizontal expansion (expand the extent of the disposal footprint), vertical expansion (increase the height of the disposal footprint), landfill mining (excavate previously disposed waste and cover material, recover earthen material or "fines" and return the waste to the disposal footprint) or a combination of these methodologies. A Public Input Session was held March, 2012 to obtain feedback on the evaluation criteria and the preliminary findings.

The evaluation and response from consultation concluded the preferred site expansion alternative consists of a modest increase in the height of the waste, an expansion of the disposal footprint to the west and north and mining a portion of the existing waste to enhance groundwater quality. All mined and expansion areas will include the



construction of a liner beneath the waste to collect leachate (precipitation contaminated as it filters through waste) and ultimately direct it to the City's sewage treatment plant for treatment.


Current Activities

The last part of Phase 2 involves assessing the potential impacts of the conceptual design and planned operation of the preferred site expansion alternative and identification of suitable mitigating measures. Multiple disciplines were involved to assess the various potential impacts of the expansion on site, off site, in the vicinity and along the access route. The access route was considered to be along Fifth Line from Highway 17 to the site (which is the same route used today). Measures to reduce or eliminate potential effects on the environment were recommended.

UTILIZATION AND REVIEW OF INTEGRATED RISK MANAGEMENT WEB TOOL

The Office of the Fire Marshal and Emergency Management (OFMEM) monitors the delivery of fire protection services by Ontario municipalities and provides a variety of tools to assist municipalities in meeting their legislative responsibilities.

In May 2014, the OFMEM announced the launch of the Integrated Risk Management (IRM) Web tool in *Fire Marshal's Communiqué 2014-12*. At the time, the OFMEM advised it would continue to engage with stakeholders to ensure future adjustments and improvements were consistent with the needs of Ontario fire departments and municipalities.

Based on a preliminary analysis and feedback received, the OFMEM is initiating a review of the IRM Web tool. In early 2016, the OFMEM will consult with municipalities and fire service stakeholders as part of this comprehensive process.

Municipalities and fire departments are reminded not to use the IRM Web tool in isolation to establish or change levels of fire protection services or to conduct a community risk assessment. The IRM Web tool is not a staffing and deployment standard, solution or equation. It does not assess, nor determine the number and type of fire suppression/emergency response resources required in a community.

The OFMEM is also in the process of conducting a comprehensive review of all OFMEM Public Fire Safety Guidelines (PFSGs), as was communicated in *Fire Marshal's Communiqué 2014-19* in October 2014. In addition, the OFMEM is considering the review of some of its other programs and resources.

Environment Commissioner's Recent Comments Concern FONOM

January 26, 2015 – Kapuskasing, ON - The Federation of Northern Ontario Municipalities (FONOM) is concerned with comments made by Ontario's recently appointed Environment Commissioner, Dianne Saxe, about the use of coloured fuel.

Coloured fuel is fuel to which a specific type and quantity of red dye has been added. This fuel is exempt from Ontario fuel taxes and is used for industrial purposes. Industries such as forestry and mining as well as our farmers readily use coloured fuel to operate equipment. As many communities in Northern and rural Ontario are dependent on these industries, any changes to the way coloured fuel is taxed will have profound implications.

The comments made by the Environment Commissioner, Dianne Saxe, refer to a provincial budget which suggests that coloured fuel consumption is subsidized by \$190 million a year, which Saxe claims that the money tends to go to the better off.

While the province continues to actively seek opportunities to cut costs and generate revenues to address the Ontario deficit, we are concerned that removing this tax exemption that assists industrial operations would be considered.

However, the impacts that this would have in Northern and rural Ontario, regions that depend heavily on industries that utilize coloured fuel must be taken into account. "We are consistently hearing from industries operating in Northern Ontario that the electricity prices are too high which is making them uncompetitive. At a time where the mining sector is struggling and forestry and farming face continuous pressure, this would only hinder their ability to be competitive," says Mayor Alan Spacek and President of FONOM.

"We are calling on the government to take a position on this issue and commit to safeguarding our industries," continued Spacek.



Joint Statement from Minister of Health and Acting Chief Medical Officer of Health on Listeria Monocytogenes Cases

January 20, 2016

Today, Dr. Eric Hoskins, Minister of Health and Long Term Care and Dr. David Williams, Acting Chief Medical Officer of Health, issued the following statement:

"We are working with Public Health Ontario and our provincial partners to investigate current cases of Listeria monocytogenes infections. Some of these cases are also part of a federally led national investigation.

To date, the source of these Listeriosis infections has not been confirmed. We will update the public as new information from the ongoing investigation becomes available.

At this time, the risk to Ontarians is low, but given that Listeria can cause severe illness to some high-risk groups, we ask you to review and follow proper safe food handling practices in an effort to prevent illnesses.

We will continue to work closely with our partners and will provide additional updates as more information becomes available. The safety of Ontarians is our top priority."

Additional background on Listeria / Listeriosis:

Some people face a higher risk of becoming sick with Listeria than others. Those who are at highest risk of serious illness include pregnant women and their unborn/newborn children, older adults, and people with weakened immune systems. High-risk individuals should follow safe food handling practices and avoid high risk food items such as:

- Uncooked meat and vegetables including pre-packaged leafy greens
- Unpasteurized (raw) milk and cheeses and other food made from unpasteurized milk
- · Ready-to-eat meats such as hot dogs, pâté and deli meat
- Refrigerated smoked seafood and fish

Listeria is a type of bacteria that can be found in food, soil, plants, sewage and other places in nature. Eating food with Listeria on it can cause a serious disease called listeriosis. People can get listeriosis by eating meat, fish, dairy products, plants or vegetables contaminated with Listeria.

Following safe food handling practices is the key to preventing Listeria and the spread of foodborne

illnesses. Foods that are contaminated with Listeria may look, smell and taste normal. Unlike most bacteria, Listeria can survive and sometimes grow on foods being stored in the refrigerator. Listeria can be killed by cooking food properly, and illnesses can be avoided by following these food safety practices.

Many people are exposed to Listeria, but only a few will actually develop listeriosis. Mild symptoms may include:

- Fever
- Muscle aches
- Nausea
- Diarrhea

Severe symptoms may include:

- Headache
- Poor coordination
- Seizures
- Neck stiffness

Listeriosis can be treated with antibiotics, but early diagnosis is key, especially for people at high risk, such as pregnant women, older adults and people with weakened immune systems.

Re: Union Gas Limited ("Union") – Request for Greenhouse Gas Emissions Impact Deferral Account

The purpose of this letter is to request the Board's approval of an accounting order to establish a deferral account to record the impacts of provincial and federal regulations related to greenhouse gas emission requirements.

In April 2015, the Ontario government announced future implementation of a Cap & Trade Program as part of its strategy to reduce Ontario's greenhouse gas emissions. The government will table draft regulations early in 2016 that will address the scope of the program, including the sectors affected. Union has been working diligently to understand the implications of Cap & Trade legislation. The forecast costs are clearly outside of Union's 2014-2018 base upon which rates were derived, and also clearly outside of management's control. The magnitude of the costs are unknown at this point, however are expected to be material.

Examples of the types of costs for inclusion in the deferral account include:

- Emissions reporting compliance costs
- Billing system changes
- External consultant costs
- Costs associated with participating in OEB Cap & Trade consultations
- Implementation costs, including additional staff costs and the purchase of allowances

Accordingly, Union requests that the Board approve the attached draft accounting order establishing a deferral account to record the impacts of provincial and federal regulations related to greenhouse gas emission requirements. Union is not seeking any determination of the potential disposition of these costs at this time.

It is Union's intention to seek any recovery of costs in a future deferral disposition proceeding.

Green Investment Fund Fighting Climate Change, Growing Ontario's Economy

The province is putting its new Climate Change Strategy into action by investing \$100 million from the Ontario Green Investment Fund to take advantage of the economic and job opportunities in clean technologies and to help homeowners reduce their energy bills and cut greenhouse gas emissions.

In partnership with Enbridge Gas Distribution and Union Gas, the program will help about 37,000 homeowners conduct audits to identify energy-saving opportunities and then complete retrofits, such as replacing furnaces, water heaters and upgrading insulation. It will also help spur innovation and create jobs in clean energy industries. Full program details, including program start date, eligible project details and amounts, will be available in the coming months.

Energy efficiency retrofits can save natural gas consumers money on their energy bills. Historically, every dollar invested in natural gas efficiency has resulted in \$1.50 to \$4 in savings for natural gas consumers.



Maintenance

Flood Update:

The SSMRCA issued 3 Flood Outlook Statements Friday, Sunday and Monday. Sault Ste. Marie received over 75 mm in 36 hours with the surrounding areas receiving up to 25 mm more. The flood control channels handled the increase in flows without issue. Field staff were concentrated on the invert at Carmen's Way continually removing debris with the excavator to keep the flows moving. The Root River stayed within bank and did not reach close to flood levels. Sections of the Big Carp River were at bank full but flows were not impeded. The Little Carp River overflowed its banks at the lower end of the river where there is a large flat delta area with wetlands.

General Maintenance

The field staff have been preparing for the winter season with general maintenance around the shop area and repair and maintenance of equipment.

Fort Creek

We are having further issues with the closed trail in Fort Creek. Our trail closure signs and fencing are being vandalized and removed. This is increasing the threat to public health and safety. In an attempt to prove a point of non-compliance those who remove the barriers are being reckless and jeopardizing the safety of others. Board members supported staff recommendation to construct a physical barrier to the trail immediately with additional signage to be erected.

We have once again removed a beaver dam in the Fort Creek, a consistent problem and have fenced off the area to prevent accidents. The dammed area is close to trails and could be a hazard if another dam is constructed. Staff are monitoring the site.

Mark's Bay

Our seasonal closure of vehicular access at Mark's Bay was put in place November 1st and will continue until April 30th as per earlier Board resolution. The closure was posted on our website, Tweeted and posted on Facebook the day before the closure. The press did not pick up the story until three weeks after the closure and there was an article in SooToday and following that, MCTV filmed an interview with staff at Mark's Bay.

The public reaction to media coverage of the restriction of vehicular traffic to Mark's Bay has been more positive than negative. A few negative phone calls and comments were made however, after explaining the situation, understanding was gained. The public are upset that there are vandals out there destroying the Conservation Area forests and wetlands. Local ice fishers are upset due to the restriction of access to the waterfront.

The attached photos just give us ideas for the pole. They show a 6" pole 20' tall. We would likely want something reflective to be seen from a farther distance and perhaps we would want the name of your community on the pole (just a thought).

- 1. Overview of original panel concept
 - -3-sided kiosk with:

-one panel including information about Lake Superior as a whole, map of the whole TCT trail, map of the TCT Lake Superior Waterway trail

-2nd panel containing safety information for paddling on the whole lake

-3rd panel containing local historical, cultural, safety information, "you are here" map information

-The project is over budget, due to rising costs and low Canadian dollar. LSWC has put in 2 proposals to NOHFC to help offset costs for the kiosk and EZ Docks. If this funding is secured, the project will still be over budget and we may need to consider how to save on some of the amenities (year 2 main amenities include flag/flag pole, kiosks, EZ Docks and lockers). If needed, we will ask the sign companies to send in quotes for both a 2-sided (one with general information about the lake and safety, and the other with local information) and a 3-sided sign to determine the difference in cost. Most would prefer a 3-sided sign and that is the goal. Will continue to look for additional funding.

2. Discussion sign samples from concept plans and from Cape Breton project -people in the diagrams from Cape Breton project give reference to the height of the sign -one sample shows a sign with a roof on it, in the past the roof acted as a UV protectant for the panels, with the new material for the signs, it is not needed for that purpose as much as it used to be. The roofed signs require cleaning of nests that get built in them. Some felt that the added maintenance wasn't worth it, others felt a roof could be a way to help paddlers recognize the landing spot. General consensus was a sign without a roof and instead have a wave effect on the top as in the samples.

-discussion about keeping the signs current- the information on all panels would be about things that don't change - local information such as the history, culture, interesting facts, safety of the location, rather than things that could change on a more regular basis such as local businesses/ services/ events – to capture local business information the community web-site or a QR code could be put on the sign and/or perhaps a waterproof pamphlet holder attached to the sign for pamphlets about local businesses/services/events -2 of the panels will be the same for all sites and the 3rd local panel would be unique to each site containing local pictures, information ... - community will provide information for the local panel to the writer

- 3. Community signage requirements (e.g. language, size, construction material, ...)
 - sign needs to follow the sign regulations for the Accessibility for Ontarians with Disabilities Act (AODA)

-certain provincial parks are designated bilingual and would need bilingual signs -Liz is going to check with the Chief to see if he wants the local Pic River panel in Ojibway and English

-TCT – trail logo has equal sizing with TCT logo, would like to see good quality maps on the signs – TCT can provide some mapping

4. Sample logos from Heidi

5. Next steps

-sending out a RFP for wording and photos for the signage -will be working on a RFP for the design of the panels and sign structure in the next couple of

weeks

-general consensus seemed to be that if cost cutting is needed, this could be an amenity that is dropped or changed in some way


-flags need to be replaced at least once a year, depending on the wind at the location, this would be the responsibility of the access point community

-some felt that a low way finding sign on the land instead of a flag would not be visible enough for paddlers, the sign could get washed away by the changing water levels, and others thought it wasn't necessary in terms of finding the community as a paddler on Lake Superior should know where they are going and be able to find the general location -however, once the paddler gets to the general location some sort of indication of the landing spot for paddlers would be helpful (e.g. if the site is trying to direct paddlers away from the main marina to a safer landing spot for paddlers, it would be helpful to have something in the air that they could easily spot from the water)


-talked about the possibility of an empty pole with a ball on top, some thought that it may seem like the location is closed for the season if there is a flag pole with no flag – there would still be the cost of putting in a pole

-suggestion about perhaps some sort of guide pole or maybe a paddle extended up from the kiosk might work to guide paddlers to the exact spot and could save money in terms of not needing another pole (site indicator would need to be visible from shore, kiosk placement may need to be changed from the original site drawings)

Dear Premier Wynne,

Please be advised that the Council for the Township of Wainfleet, at its meeting held on January 26th, 2016, passed the following resolution:

WHEREAS the Independent Electrical System Operator, under Ministerial Directive, issued an RFP for additional renewable energy generation including 300 MW of wind generation and is considering issuing further RFPs for 2016;

AND WHEREAS the December 2015 Auditor General's report confirmed that Ontario is generating surplus electricity with capacity increasing by 19% in the last 8 years while demand fell by 7.5% in the same period. Additional capacity is not required at this time;

AND WHEREAS the Auditor General also reported that the existing Feed In Tariff (FIT) contracts mean that Ontario power consumers will pay a premium of \$9.2 billion for renewable power with wind power pricing that is double the prices paid in other jurisdictions;

AND WHEREAS the Ontario Chamber of Commerce reports that the escalating price of electricity is undermining their members' capacity to grow, hire new workers, and attract investment, and that Ontario's electricity costs are among the highest in North America, making the province uncompetitive for business growth;

AND WHEREAS adding wind to Ontario's grid drives CO_2 emissions higher. The Ontario Society of Professional Engineers estimated that wind with natural gas backup produces base-load electricity at about 200 grams of CO_2 emissions/kWh compared with the current system average level of 40 grams CO_2 emissions/kWh;

AND WHEREAS Nature Canada reports that wind power facilities have a substantial negative impact on endangered species including migrating bats and birds as well as destroying habitat for species at risk;

AND WHEREAS wind power is an intermittent source of electricity generation meaning that it cannot be used to replace dependable generating capacity without natural gas as a back-up;

Resolution Requesting that Ontario Cancel RFP for Added Wind Power Generation 2016 02 03 Page 2

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Council of the Township of Wainfleet requests:

- 1. That the Province of Ontario exercise its rights in Section 4.13 (12) of the current LRP I RFP to 'cancel the process at any stage and for any reason' and not issue any new wind generation contracts;
- That the Province of Ontario hold off any further renewable procurement process until the capacity is actually required and focus on sources that will actually reduce carbon emissions;
- 3. That the IESO review the outstanding FIT contracts that have not achieved 'Commercial Operation', and vigorously enforce the terms of the FIT contract with a view to eliminating further expensive wind generation capacity being added to the grid.

Council has requested that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to all 444 municipalities in Ontario for their endorsement and support, as well as to local MPP's, the Progressive Conservative Party of Ontario and the Ontario NDP.

On behalf of Council, thank you for your consideration of this request.

WHEREAS in April of 2015 the OPP search and rescue helicopter was redeployed from Sudbury to Orillia;

AND WHEREAS since the announcement of the redeployment was made, concerns have been expressed over the protection of people in the North, as the response time from Orillia is increased by a minimum of one hour to Sudbury;

AND WHEREAS Orilla is located in a snow belt and helicopters are allegedly not always able to fly in an emergency as a result of the weather conditions;

AND WHEREAS many areas in the North can only be accessed by air in a more timely manner;

AND WHEREAS faster response times can mean the difference between life and death in certain conditions;

AND WHEREAS results of a review of the decision to move the OPP search and rescue helicopter from Sudbury to Orillia have not yet been made available and the helicopter remains in Orillia;


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

1. "What do we get for the \$688.00 OGRA membership?

a. Benefits by belonging to OGRA. First and foremost you receive the lower member rate when registering for our various training programs.

The non-member fee to attend our courses or to attend the OGRA/ROMA Combined Conference are substantially higher and you would only have to take a couple of courses per year to more than cover the membership fee. The Township also gets a subscription to our quarterly magazine "Milestones" and you can also take advantage of the member rate to advertise job openings on the careers section of our website.

b) OGRA advocates on your behalf with the Province of Ontario and attempts to influence the Policy agenda of the government. The Minimum Maintenance Standards is a perfect example of regulations that OGRA fought for and won to protect municipalities from lawsuits. Now you could argue that we will continue to do this regardless whether you pay your membership, however if all municipalities took that approach OGRA would not be able to continue this valuable work.

c) OGRA has many member services that as a member municipality you can have access to at no cost. Municipal DataWorks, our asset repository is free to OGRA members and can help you manage your roads, bridges, facilities and other assets and help you develop your Asset Management Plans that are required by the Province of Ontario. The Winter Web App is another great tool that is yours free of charge to develop your winter operations plan. We are shortly going to be releasing version 2 which will provide many more features. A non-member licence for MDW and the WWA are \$1,200 and \$500.00 per year respectively and these are only two of the many servicesOGRA offers to its members. Our involvement on various committees looking at current issues such as premature pavement deterioration is another example of the work that OGRA does on your behalf.

2. If our township was to opt out of OGRA/ membership fees what consequences would there be as a result?

You would have to pay the non-member rate to attend our training courses or the annual conference and if you are using MDW or the WWB you would have to start paying the annual licence fee. You would also lose your subscription to Milestones. The bigger issue is that OGRA has a lot of influence with the Province of Ontario mainly because we can currently claim that 432 of the 444 municipalities in the Province are members. There is strength in numbers
