IN FLANDERS FIELDS is the world's most famous war memorial poem. It was written by Canadian Lieutenant Colonel John McCrae. He composed it at the battlefront on May 3, 1915 during the second battle of Ypres, Belgium.

In Flanders fields the poppies blow Between the crosses, row on row, That mark our place: and in the sky

The larks still bravely singing fly Scarce heard amid the guns below.

We are the dead: Short days ago, We lived, felt dawn, saw sunset glow, Loved and were loved: and now we lie In Flanders fields!

Take up our quarrel with the foe To you, from failing hands, we throw The torch: be yours to hold it high If ye break faith with us who die, We shall not sleep, though poppies grow In Flanders fields.



We have it! J.K. Rowling's first novel for adults.

This is a big novel about a small town.

When Barry Fairbrother dies in his early forties, the town of Pagford is left in shock.

Pagford is, seemingly, an English idyll, with a cobbled market square and an ancient abbey, but what lies behind the pretty façade is a town at war.

Rich at war with poor, teenagers at war with their parents, wives at war with their husbands, teachers at war with their pupils...Pagford is not what it first seems.

And the empty seat left by Barry on the parish council soon becomes the catalyst for the biggest war the town has yet seen. Who will triumph in an election fraught with passion, duplicity, and unexpected revelations?

We also recommend...

"The Bone Bed" by Patricia Cornwell. This is another thriller in the very popular Kay Scarpetta series but with a Canadian connection. A woman has vanished while digging a dinosaur bone in the remote wilderness of Canada. The evidence suggests a Boston connection. Suddenly everyone in the Chief Medical Examiner's office becomes very secretive.

In "Sleep No More" by Iris Johansen, forensic sculptor, Eve Duncan begins to question everything she thought she knew about her

family and her past when her mother asks her to look into the case of a woman missing from a mental hospital. Soon Eve realizes that she has a half sister and that they are all in grave danger. Read on.

We also have three new books for Young Adults that I won at a recent Ontario Library Services North conference – "Pomeroy's Quay" by E.G. Forward; "World Awakening" by James Duncan; and "The Underling" by Ian McKercher.

It has been very busy and we have completed the financial reports to bring the municipality up to date.

The provincial funding that was previously withheld has been paid to the township.

The Strategic Plan committee has met twice and started formulating the new plan. This newsletter has a survey included and all those who reply to the survey by the deadline will be entered into a draw for a prize valued at \$50 or more.

Council made a generous donation from their honorariums towards the Algo Relief Fund, following the collapse of the mall roof in Elliot Lake.

COUNCIL MEETING SCHEDULE

Regular Council Meetings Tuesday Nov. 13th, 2012 6:45 p.m.

Committee of Adjustment Tuesday Nov. 13th, 2012 6:30 p.m.

Agendas can be picked up at the municipal office after 4:00 p.m. on the Friday before. **Garbage and Recycling** Residential refuse should be curbside before 7:30 a.m. on collection day. Place bags/containers on the ground as close as possible to the roadway, but not on traveled roadway or on top of snow banks.

Each residence is limited to two bags/containers of refuse. Tags must be affixed to any excess bags/containers. Tags may be purchased at the Airways General Store or the Municipal Office.

Containers may not exceed 121 litres. Any container over 121 litres is considered a storage unit and every bag of refuse in the unit is counted as a bag. Maximum weight for bags/containers is 20 kg. or 44 pounds.

There is an issue with garbage being put into the recycling containers at the back of the municipal office. Styrofoam, plastic bags, margarine/sour cream containers, yogurt containers, fruit/vegetable trays, lawn, etc. are **not** accepted. Please check the numbers as well. Only containers with # 1 and # 2 are accepted, with the exception of the containers mentioned above. The recycling area is not to be used to dump your trash. If you have extra trash please purchase an extra garbage tag or take it to the local landfill.

Please be advised that the Recycling Crew will longer sort your recycling, due to safety concerns. (eg. Broken glass, can lids, dirty diapers etc.) If it is not sorted properly it will be left behind.

Please DO NOT use plastic bags to sort your recycling. The recycling depot does not take the plastic bags, so the road crew has to spend time undoing the bags and taking everything out of the bags. We do appreciate everyone's efforts to make it easier for our Road Crew.

EMERGENCY PLANNING FOR EXTREME COLD WEATHER


Prepare Your Home and Car for Winter At Home:

- Have alternate means of heating with sufficient fuel, such as a wood or propane furnace, or a kerosene heater. Ensure alternative source of heat is approved for indoor use
- Generator with several days' worth of fuel (Caution: generators produce toxic gases such as carbon monoxide. These should only be used outdoors where fumes may be vented safely.)
- Electric space heaters with automatic shut-off and non-glowing elements(to reduce the risk of fire)
- Blankets

In the Car:

- Travel with a mobile phone
- Blankets and other warm clothing (gloves, toques, jacket) – never rely on a car for heat since it may break down
- First aid kit
- Signaling device, such as road flares
- Booster cables
- Toolkit
- Bag of sand (to pour on ice or snow for added traction)
- Tow rope
- Collapsible shovel
- Flash light and spare batteries
- Candles and matches
- Brightly colored clothes
- Container of water and high energy bars
- Windshield scraper
