ATTENTION BASE LINE RESIDENTS

Union Gas has now been approved for Prince Township. Households on the north side of Base Line may be able to convert their home-heating systems to natural gas this year and obtain road crossing service from the existing gas main that runs along the south side.

However, no new pipeline construction will take place this year.

Future extension of pipelines along Airport, Gagnon and Walls Road will depend on how many residents wish to switch to natural gas to meet their home energy needs.

FIRE DEPARTMENT

When a Restricted Fire Ban is in effect and no open burning is allowed, this includes campfires, portable fire pits, chimnayas, barrels or any other device that burns wood. The fire department will respond to any calls related to the infraction of the fire ban and charges and or fines will be laid. Please respect the fire ban for your own safety and the safety of your neighbours.

BURNING PERMITS

Anyone wishing to burn must drop by the Municipal Office Mon.—Tues.-Thurs — Fri. 8:30 to 4:30 to pick up your FREE burning permit. **No day burning** still applies. Residents are permitted to burn between 6p.m. and 9a.m. **WITH** a permit.

I hope everyone is enjoying this beautiful summer weather. It seems like we jumped from winter to summer without spring this year.

At the July meeting of Council, the budget was passed with a municipal residential tax rate of 0.895857%. This is a 7.519% decrease from last year's rate. The tax bills were mailed on July 15, 2013. If you did not receive your bill, please contact the office.

Canada Post will continue to forward mail until November 19, 2013. In a recent reminder that was sent to residents, Canada Post referred to the mailing address as Prince. This was an error by Canada Post. The correct address is Prince Township. (Twp. may be used, as well) We were assured that if Prince is used and the postal code is accurate, it should not cause a problem. They also referred to Walls Road as Walls Side Road. Walls Road is accurate.

The resurfacing of Douglas Drive and a short section of Base Line should be commencing soon. Please expect delays and be considerate of the workers.

Day Camp has been very successful this year. Most days are almost filled to capacity. We do have room, so don't hesitate to call if you want to send your children to us.

At the end of August we will be saying goodbye to our NOHFC youth intern. Laura will be heading off to law school in Windsor. We wish her the best of luck with her studies. Laura has been a remarkable asset in the office and she will be sorely missed!

Council has approved the funding for a new sign

DOGS AT LARGE

Complaints continue to be received about dogs at large and barking dogs.

Dog owners are asked to be considerate by:

- Cleaning up after your pet, especially if it is done on a neighbour's property, on the street or on public property.
- 2. Make sure that your pet is on your property and not someone else's.
- 3. Stopping excessive barking instantly.

Patrols will be increased, and charges may be laid.

BUILDING PERMITS

Please remember that building permits are required for re-shingling, new windows & doors, siding, fences etc., as well as houses, garages and accessory buildings.

Recycling

Recycling saves trees, protects habitat, helps reduce greenhouse gases, reduces the need for landfills, and curbs pollution. The average homeowner can reduce garbage by as much as 30 or 40 per cent by recycling. Increasing the use of your

blue box will minimize household garbage and help to keep within the two-bag/container garbage limit.

The Township provides curbside collection on a bi-weekly basis. See the first page of the newsletter that has a chart to when your area has pick up. Recyclable materials can also be deposited in the bins located at the back of the Municipal Building. Bins are clearly marked as to where to put your recyclables. Please remember that only recyclable items may be left there, *no garbage*.

Reusable household construction and renovation materials can be brought to the Habitat for Humanity ReStore at the corner of Second and North Street.

Please remove all lids and food contents before recycling, rinse containers and remove caps. steel (tin) food cans aluminum cans

No. 1 plastic <u>bottles</u> (e.g. pop bottles)
No. 2 plastic <u>bottles</u> (e.g. shampoo bottles)
glass bottles and jars (it is not necessary to
separate coloured from clear glass)
(wine and liquor bottles may be returned to The
Beer Store for a deposit refund)

Remove labels and rinse both steel and aluminum cans. Place lids inside cans and pinch in the rim of the can to reduce injuries to recycling workers.

newspapers and flyers
magazines
phone books
boxboard/small boxes (e.g. cereal boxes)
paper egg cartons
toilet/towel paper rolls
clean milk cartons
clean pizza boxes

all other paper products (e.g. mail, computer paper)

Cardboard boxes should be broken down and bundled in 2' x 2' x1' bundles and placed beside the yellow box.

All food trays, strawberry containers, etc. should be placed in garbage.

Place your blue box in your driveway for pick up by 7:30 a.m.


