It sure is cold out there. It's perfect weather to curl up with a good book

and a hot drink.



In the Library we have "Kinsey and Me: Stories" by Sue Grafton and Bill Pronzini. Thirty years ago Ms. Grafton introduced us to Kinsey Millhone. Now to celebrate the anniversary of this character the author reaveals to us Kinsey's origins and some of her own past.

This book is in two parts: the nine Kinsey stories (1986-93) and the And Me stories written a decade after Grafton's mother died. They show how much of Kinsey is from the creator's past and reveal a child who, free of parental interventions, read everything and roamed everywhere. The dark side of such freedom is parental distance.

The same unique voice and witty insights readers fell in love with in "A Is for Alibi" permeate the Kinsey stories. The stories of "And Me" trace a remarkable voyage from anger to understanding, from pain to forgiveness. Each family is dysfunctional in its own way, but Grafton tells her family's story in a sensitive, delicate and loving way, enriching the way we see Kinsey and get to know Sue, and maybe helping us see our own childhood from a different perspective. Enjoy.



2. "Bughouse Affair" by Marcia Muller is the first of a new series of lighthearted historical mysteries set in 1890s San Francisco with former Pinkerton operative Sabina Carpenter and her partner, ex-Secret Service agent John Quincannon. They take on what seems to be two unrelated investigations.

Sabrina is looking into a case involving a "lady" who relieves her victims of their valuables at Chutes Amusement Park and other crowded places. Quincannon is after a housebreaker who targets the homes of the wealthy in the Barbary Coast area. This leads him to a parlor house known as Fiddle Dee Dee.

The two cases eventually connect, but not before two murders and assorted other crimes complicate matters. What fun!



3. "<u>Notorious Nineteen</u>" by Janet Evanovich is another irresistible Stephanie Plum novel

Stephanie is certain of three truths: People don't just vanish into thin air. Never anger old people. And don't do what Tiki tells you to do.

After a slow summer, Stephanie finally lands an assignment that could put her back in the black. It involves a client accused of embezzling millions from an assisted-living facility. He has disappeared from the hospital after an emergency appendectomy and she must track him down. Nobody's talking and since it is difficult for Stephanie to blend in to an assisted living facility, she enlists the help of Grandma Mazur. Then a second felon goes missing from the same hospital. She calls in Trenton's hottest cop. Joe Morelli to help her crack the case. Unfortunately she also has to take on a second job to "pay the rent" and finds that she has more trouble than she needs. A good read.

ADMINISTRATOR NEWS

Happy Valentine's Day!

Just a reminder that the garbage and recycling pick up is now on Tuesdays. The two week schedule still applies for recycling and both will be delayed by one day when there is a holiday.

Anthony Rossi, of Calam Rossi Accounting, presented the 2011 draft financial statements to council at the January meeting. The township financial statements are now up to date. As previously explained, the back up occurred due to a combination of events, including the mandate of the PSAB (Public Sector Accounting Board) change in our accounting practices, the introduction of Asset Management, that accompanied the PSAB changes, our new integrated (and complicated) accounting software, as well as a change of 3 Administrators during this time frame. As anticipated, the financial records are now in good shape and there were no discrepancies found in any area.

The Strategic Plan committee has been meeting regularly and the update is coming along. Keep watching for the date for the public open house to see what is being proposed in the plan. It is anticipated it will be within the next month.

The Fire Chief proposed some amendments to the Open Air Burning By-Law. His main concern was large brush burning in the off season, from November 1st to March 31st. Council passed the amended by-law and

will have further discussions regarding the cost for the permits. The Fire Chief and I suggested that a seasonal permit for the April 1 to October 31 time frame would be \$10.00. A winter permit would be \$5.00. This user fee is yet to be determined.

EMERGENCY PLANNING FOR EXTREME COLD WEATHER

<u>Prepare Your Home and Car for Winter</u>

At Home:

- Have alternate means of heating with sufficient fuel, such as a wood or propane furnace, or a kerosene heater. Ensure alternative source of heat is approved for indoor use
- Generator with several days' worth of fuel (Caution: generators produce toxic gases such as carbon monoxide. These should only be used outdoors where fumes may be vented safely.)
- Electric space heaters with automatic shut-off and non-glowing elements(to reduce the rick of fire)
- Blankets

In the Car:

- Travel with a mobile phone
- Blankets and other warm clothing (gloves, toques, jacket) – never rely on a car for heat since it may

- break down
- First aid kit
- Signalling device, such as road flares
- Booster cables
- Toolkit
- Bag of sand (to pour on ice or snow for added traction)
- Tow rope
- Collapsible shovel
- Flash light and spare batteries
- Candles and matches
- Brightly coloured clothes
- Container of water and high energy bars
- Windshield scraper

TIPS FOR DEALING WITH WINTER STORMS

Winter storms can be treacherous and damaging if you are unprepared. They can disrupt power supply and transportation and create home and personal safety issues. Bitter cold and winter storms kill more people than the number of Canadians killed by tornadoes, thunderstorms, lightning, floods and hurricanes combined. Being prepared can literally save your life.

When winter storms are expected, Emergency Management Ontario advises the public to follow these safety tips. Personal Preparedness

If you are indoors

- Listen to the radio and/or television for weather reports and emergency information.
- Ensure you have a well-stocked emergency kit, including a good supply of food.

- Bring pets/companion animals inside during winter weather. Move other animals or livestock to sheltered areas with non-frozen drinking water.
- Stay indoors. If you must go outside, dress for the weather to avoid serious cold-related injuries.

If you are outdoors

- Avoid overexertion when shoveling snow. If you must shovel snow, ensure you take frequent breaks so as not to over-stress your body.
- Dress in several layers of lightweight clothing, wear mittens and a hat (preferably one that covers your ears).
- Wear waterproof, insulated boots to keep your feet warm and dry and to maintain your footing in ice and snow.
- Cover your mouth. Protect your lungs from extremely cold air by covering your mouth when outdoors.
- Change wet clothing frequently to prevent a loss of body heat. Wet clothing loses all of its insulating value and transmits heat rapidly.
- It is important to regularly check for frostbite, indicators include numbness or white areas on your face and extremities (ears, nose, cheeks, hands and feet in particular).

Home Preparedness Getting your home ready

- Cover windows with plastic from the inside to keep cold air out.
- Run water, even at a trickle, to help prevent pipes from freezing.
- If the pipes freeze, remove any insulation or layers of newspapers and wrap pipes in rags. Completely open all faucets and pour hot water over the pipes, starting where they were most exposed to the cold (or where the cold was most likely to penetrate).
- Maintain ventilation when using kerosene heaters to avoid build-up of toxic fumes. Refuel kerosene heaters outside and keep them at least three feet from flammable objects.
