For something different read <u>The End of Your Life Book Club</u> by Will Schwalbe.

Mary Anne Schwalbe was a renowned educator who filled such august positions as Director of Admissions at Harvard and Director of College Counseling at New York's prestigious Dalton School. She also felt it incumbent upon herself to educate the less fortunate and spent the last 10 years of her life building libraries in Afghanistan. But her story here begins with a mocha, dispensed from a machine in the waiting room of the Memorial Sloan-Kettering Cancer Center. Over coffee, Will casually asks his mom what she's been reading. The conversation they have grows into tradition: soon they mutually agree to read the same books and share them together as Mary Anne waits for her chemotherapy treatments. The books they read. chosen by both, range from the classic to the popular: from The Painted Veil to The Girl with the Dragon Tattoo; from My Father"s Tears to the Christian spiritual classic Daily Strength for Daily Needs. Their discussions reveal how books become increasingly important to the connection between a remarkable woman whose life is coming to a close, and a young man becoming closer to his mom than ever before.



Speaking of Book Club, the date has been moved to Thursday, June 13 at 7 p.m. You still have time to read In The Shadow of the Banyan by Vaddey Ratner and join us for a good discussion.

- Prince Township has received funding for the Roads and Day Camp programs and will be hiring 6 summer students this month. We are looking forward to another successful summer with both of these programs.
- Prince Township will be signing an agreement with AP Wireless to renegotiate the Township's cell tower lease with Bell Canada. Council is hopeful that the results will provide an increased financial benefit to the Township, along with the possibility of improved cellular service reception. More updates to come, as we are simply beginning this renegotiation process.
- We are pleased to welcome back our Roads Superintendent Brian Evans on June 3rd. Brian has made great progress in recovering from a non-work related injury, and will soon return to working full-time this

- summer. We would like to thank Harry Hadikin for all his work over the past few months as Interim Roads Superintendent.
- Prince Township Council has recognized June as Seniors' Month. I would like to thank all seniors for the important role they play in our Township and for all their positive contributions to community life.
- I encourage all residents to review the draft copy of the Prince Township Accessibility Plan 2013-2018, available in the Municipal Office and on the homepage of the Township website (www.princetwp.ca). Public feedback is an important part of this process, so please do not hesitate to share your comments on this plan with the Municipal Office. With this plan, I am confident our Township will succeed in working to meet provincially-mandated accessibility standards.
- At the May 14, 2013 meeting Council voted to form a Budget Committee consisting of Reeve Lamming, Councillor Yanni, and myself as the CAO/Administrator to work on preparing a budget for the next fiscal year. WASTE DISPOSAL ISSUES

Garbage Bag Limits

There is a two bag/week limit. Additional garbage tags are available at the Municipal Office and at the Airways Store for \$2.00/each.

Prince Lake

Garbage pickup at the Lake started May 1st on **Wednesdays**. Please have your garbage out by 7 a.m. No garbage is to be placed at the corner of Prince Lake Road and Second Line between May 1st and October 31st.

Health and Safety

Garbage must be placed in large refuse/garbage bags. For health and safety reasons, garbage placed in grocery or small kitchen bags and place in a garbage can will not be collected.

We are also advised that the weight restriction of 44lbs/20 kg per bag. This is also a safety issue, and **bags in**

excess of 44 lbs will not be collected. Please have your garbage out by 7 a.m. Working together for happy and healthy garbage collectors!!!

BUILDING PERMITS

Please remember that building permits are required for re-shingling, new windows & doors, siding etc., as well as houses, garages and accessory buildings.

911 SIGNS

Residents are requested to make sure that 911 civic number signs are clear of trees, etc. The sign should be visible by emergency personnel from 100 ft.

ATTENTION: DIRT BIKERS

Motorized vehicles are prohibited from Township Parks.

Complaints have been received with regard to dirt bikes trespassing over private property. Please ride your dirt bikes considerately and safely.

Dirt bikes and ATVs on any road must conform to the Highway Traffic Act when it comes to equipment and insurance. The driver must also have a valid licence.

DOGS AT LARGE

Dog owners are asked to be considerate by:

- Cleaning up after your pet, especially if it is done on a neighbour's property, on the street or on public property.
- 2. Make sure that your pet is on your property and not someone else's.
- 3. Stopping excessive barking instantly.

Patrols will be increased, and charges may be laid.



FEEDING WILD ANIMALS

Complaints continue to be received about people feeding wild animals such as raccoons, coyotes and foxes in the hamlet area. People who attract wild animals to their property or who feed them do harm to the animals by making them less afraid of humans, by encouraging them to eat foods that may not be natural or healthy for them, and by disrupting their instinctive food finding and feeding behaviors.

Encouraging animals to visit your property affects your neighbours and puts them at unnecessary and unwelcome risk of disease or injury exposure. Although your intentions may be to show kindness to the animal, you may be creating an unsafe environment for your neighbours.

If you are attracting wild animals to your property and/or feeding the animals, please stop, to protect yourself, your neighbours and the animals.

Council will be considering a by-law to address this issue at the next council meeting June 11, 2013.

Keep bears out of your neighbourhood

Problems with bears are usually created by people. By following these tips every spring, summer and fall, you can avoid attracting bears to your property:

Garbage:

Eliminate odours. Put garbage in containers that have tight fitting lids, and only put it out on the morning of garbage day, not the night before.

Whenever possible, store garbage in bear-resistant containers, or indoors (house, shed, garage).

Do not store garbage in plywood boxes, old freezers or vehicles. Put meat scraps in the freezer until garbage day.

If you do not have curbside pickup, take your garbage to the dump often. Frequently wash garbage cans and recycle containers and lids with a strong smelling disinfectant.

Bird/Pet food:

Fill bird feeders only through the winter months.

Do not leave pet food outdoors. Feed pets indoors, not outside or in screened in areas or porches.

Fruits/Vegetables/Compost:

Avoid landscaping with trees, shrubs or plants that produce food known to attract bears (some examples include crab apple trees, mountain ash, beech and oak).

Do not put meat, fish or sweet food (including fruit) in your composter.

Remove vegetables and fallen fruit from the ground.

Pick all ripe fruit from trees and bushes.

Smells:

Be aware that cooking odours can attract bears. Remove grease and food residue from barbecue grills, including the grease cup underneath, after each use.

Learn about bears, their needs and behaviour. Share your knowledge with others. Encourage your neighbours and your community to practice Bear Wise habits. It takes everyone working together to keep bears away.
