Administrator's Council Report



I hope you get to enjoy time with your family and friends over the holiday.

Council accepted the resignation of Ron Amadio, from Council, effective August 15th. Because the resignation was within 90 days of the election, this seat will remain vacant until the new council takes office in December 2014. Thank you, Ron, for your years of service and dedication to the municipality!

Council also accepted the resignation of Bill MacKenzie from the road department. Bill has moved on to a new position and the Council and Staff wish him all the best in his new endeavour.

Lupus is an autoimmune disease that can cause severe damage to the tissue and organs in the body and can sometimes lead to death. Council has been asked to declare October as Lupus Awareness Month, to increase public and private sector funding for medical research, targeted education programs and worldwide recognition.

The nominations for candidates in the municipal election closed on September 12, 2014. Since there will be an election for Reeve, Council and 3 of the 4 school boards, you may have candidates coming by or calling for support. The Women's Institute is hosting an All Candidates Meeting at the Township Community Centre on October 8, 2014 at 7:00 pm. This will be set up as a formal question period. Come out and hear what the candidates

have to say.

Make sure you check with the office or the candidates to make sure your name is on the voter's list.

The township has declared the 1999 Chevrolet ³/₄ ton truck as surplus. It has 321,200 km, tires are approximately 75% tread - snow tires. They are the same tires as below, but not studded. Council has set a minimum bid of \$500.

Ten Halloween Safety Tips

- 1. Children should be accompanied by an adult.
- 2. Children should wear clothing that can easily be seen at night. Retro-reflective materials are best.
- 3. Children should trick or treat in one well-known area and not wander into unknown neighborhoods.
- 4. All candy should be inspected by an adult to make sure that no one has tampered with it. If it looks suspicious, the police should be contacted.
- 5. Children should avoid stray animals.
- 6. Children should wear masks that do not interfere with vision. Better yet, they can avoid masks by wearing makeup.
- 7. Children should watch for moving vehicles when crossing streets.
- 8. Costumes should be short enough that the child will not trip.
- 9. Trick or treaters should dress appropriately for the weather and carry a flashlight.
- 10. For extra safety, organize a Halloween party for children in your neighborhood.

Halloween safety: Tips for families

Halloween can be a fun and exciting time for kids. These safety tips for parents, children and homeowners will help keep everyone safe and happy this Halloween.

For parents:

Do not use masks. Masks make it hard for children to see what's around them, including cars. Try a hypoallergenic (less likely

to cause an allergic reaction), non-toxic make-up kit instead.

- Make or buy costumes in lightcoloured material. Place strips of reflective tape on the back and front, so that drivers can better see your child.
- Costumes should fit properly to prevent trips and falls. Avoid items such as oversized shoes, high heels, long dresses or capes.
- Put your child's name, address and phone number on his costume.
- Children under 10 should be accompanied by an adult for trick or treating. By the age of 10, some children are ready to go trick-ortreating with a group of friends.

If your child is going out without an adult:

- Make sure your child is in a group of at least 3 people.
- Give them a flashlight. A cell phone is also a good idea if you have one.
- Draw a map outlining the route they should follow. Ask them to call you if they plan to go on a street that isn't on the route.
- Set a curfew (and make sure they have a watch with them).
- Tell your children not to eat anything until they get home.

For children and youth:

- Carry a white bag or pillowcase for your candy, or add some reflective tape.
- Bring a cell phone, in case you need to make an emergency phone call.

- Always travel in groups. Be sure there are at least 3 of you at all times.
- Let your parents know where you're going to be at all times.
- Don't visit houses that are not well lit.

 Never go inside a stranger's house.
- Walk on the sidewalk whenever possible. If there's no sidewalk, walk on the side of the road facing traffic.
- Don't criss-cross back and forth across the street. Work your way up one side of the street, and then start on the other.
- If you have any allergies, tell the person who is giving out the treats.
- Don't eat any of your treats before you get home. When home, ask your parents look through your treats with you to make sure everything is okay.

For homeowners:

- Turn on outdoor lights, and replace burnt-out bulbs.
- Remove items from your yard or porch that might trip a child.
- Sweep wet leaves from your steps and sidewalk.
- Use alternative to candles in your pumpkins, such as a flashlight or a batteryoperated candle. If you are using a candle, don't leave the pumpkin unattended.
- Remember that some children have food allergies. Consider giving treats other than candy, such as stickers, erasers or yo-yos.



Fire Safety Tips

Burns - The Need For Caution

Every year in Canada, severe injuries and deaths occur as a result of burns and scalds. Sadly, many of these injuries affected children and could have easily been prevented. Usually, it's children's curiosity that gets them into trouble. They come across a lighter or matches, or they manage to get too close to a baseboard heater or a hot stove element.

Burns from Hot Liquids

- When bathing children, always turn cold water on first before the hot. Test the water temperature before allowing your child to get into the bathtub or shower. Consider adjusting your hot water heater to a maximum temperature of 49°C or 120°F.
- Children should not play with a hot water tap. Teach them to turn the cold water on first.
- Avoid carrying or holding children while you are drinking a hot beverage.

Burns from Household Appliances

- Turn pot handles towards the centre of the stove.
- Keep cords for electrical appliances such as deep fryers, kettles, steam irons and toasters out of the reach of children.
- Supervise children near lamps with accessible hot light bulbs.
- Store items that interest children, such as cookies, away from the immediate area around the kitchen stove.
- Keep children away from stationary and portable heaters.

Lighters and Matches

Every year hundreds of fires are started by children playing with lighters or matches. Many of these fires are caused by children under the age of five. Children as young as 18 months have caused fires by operating lighters. Disposable lighters sold by retailers must be child-resistant, but remember, child-resistant does not mean childproof. Store lighters out of sight and out of the reach of children and do not remove the child safety devices from the lighter. Remember to:

- Teach children that lighters and matches are not toys.
- Instruct young children to tell an adult if they find lighters or matches.
- Set a good example: always use lighters and matches responsibly.
- Install and maintain smoke alarms.
- Supervise your children's play.

Prevention is the best way to keep your home safe from fire. For more information on fire prevention, contact your local Fire Department.

Quick Facts on CO

WHAT IS IT: A colourless, odourless and tasteless gas.

SIGNS: Stuffy air, water vapour, backdraft and soot from a fireplace.

SYMPTOMS: Headaches, weakness, nausea, vomiting and loss of muscle control. They can be mistaken for flu symptoms.

EFFECTS: If inhaled, carbon monoxide deprives the blood of oxygen. Prolonged exposure can lead to unconsciousness, brain damage or death.

CAUSES: Blocked or dirty vents, flues, chimneys and furnaces, as well as improper ventilation of burning fireplaces or woodstoves.

DEATHS: Approximately 200 per year.

PREVENTION: Annual inspection and cleaning of:

- Furnaces
- Chimneys
- Fireplaces
- Other fuel-burning equipment such as gas dryers

Safety tips on how to avoid carbon monoxide poisoning

INSTALL at least one carbon monoxide detector in your home.

ENSURE a wood or coal-burning stove is properly installed and vented.

DON'T operate a gasoline-powered engine, kerosene stove or charcoal grill in a closed space.

BARBECUE grills should never be operated indoors.

CHECK clothes dryer vents that open outside the house for lint.

CHECK forced air fans for proper ventilation.

If you suspect carbon monoxide in your home, get out immediately and call the fire department.
