The Township is in need of a Community Emergency Management Coordinator (CEMC) and an alternate. These are volunteer positions.

The CEMC is responsible for:

- Activating and arranging the Emergency Operations Centre (EOC);
- Ensuring that security is in place for the EOC and registration of Community Control Group members (CCG);
- Ensuring that all members of the CCG have necessary plans, resources, supplies, maps, and equipment;
- Providing advice and clarifications about the implementation details of the Emergency Response Plan;
- Ensuring liaison with community support agencies (e.g. St. John Ambulance, Canadian Red Cross);
- Ensuring that the operating cycle is met by the CCG and related documentation is maintained and kept for future reference;
- Addressing any action items that may result from the activation of the Emergency Response Plan and keep CCG informed of implementation needs;
- Maintaining the records and logs for the purpose of debriefs and post-emergency reporting that will be prepared.

Training will be provided.

CAO REPORT

I hope you are all enjoying the beautiful fall weather we have been experiencing. The colours were glorious, although a bit later than usual.

We are expecting delivery of the split top recycle carts in November. Some people, with longer driveways, have expressed concern about managing the carts even though they are on wheels. If you feel they will be too onerous, you have two choices.

1. You can leave the cart on your property near the end of your

- driveway and sort and empty your blue boxes into the cart and move it to the road on collection day.
- 2. You can take advantage of the recycle bins at the back of the municipal office any day.

The recyclable items remains the same and corrugated cardboard needs to be bundled and tied and set beside the carts, as it will cause jamming if put in the carts.

More information and reminders will be provided closer to the launch.

Thank you for your co-operation during this transition.

Between November 1 and March 31 you do not need burning permits for bonfires and cook fires. Below is Sections 5 & 6, extracted from By-Law 2013-04 with specific rules that apply: PART 5 – OPEN AIR BURNING – NOVEMBER 1 TO MARCH 31

- 5.1 No permits are required for cooking fires or bon fires up to 1 metre in diameter and 1 metre in height.
- 5.2 Permits will be required for brush piles larger than 1 metre in height and 1 metre in diameter and shall not exceed 2 metres in height and 4 metres in diameter.
 - (a) These special permits will only be issued in this time frame and not during the regular burn season from May 1st to Oct 31st.
 - (b) All normal precautions need to be adhered to. Heavy equipment, water, hand tools and fire suppression equipment must be on site and readily accessible.
 - (c) A site inspection by the Fire Department is required before a permit can be issued to ensure proper setbacks.
- 5.3 All fires must be attended at all times.
 Unattended fires will be in violation of the bylaw.

- 5.4 Burning can take place during the day or night but must take into consideration wind speed, wind direction, fog conditions, ground moisture and nuisance to neighbours and roadways.
- 5.5 Nuisance burning that impacts a neighbour or road as outlined in the Open Air Burning By Law 2012-11 will be considered in violation of the by law.
- 5.6 Fires that impact on neighbouring properties or roadways must be extinguished immediately or be in violation of the by law.
- 5.7 Failure to comply with this by law will subject the homeowner to the fine schedule as laid out in the current open air burning by law 2012-11.

PART 6 – BURNING OF LEAVES

- 6.1 The burning of leaves is expressly forbidden throughout the year, with the exception of the months of May and October.
- 6.2 All other provisions of this by-law, including size and time restrictions, shall apply when burning leaves under section 5.

Fire Department

As you know, the winter season is knocking at our door. Heaters are turned on and wood stoves are cranked up.

This is just a friendly reminder from your local Fire Department.

- Test your smoke alarms and remember to replace the batteries
- If you burn wood or other fuel, consider purchasing a carbon monoxide detector, it could be a life-saver!
- If you already have a carbon monoxide detector, test it and remember to replace the batteries.
- Make sure your furnace or wood stove is in proper working order and check that the chimney is clear of any obstructions.

Make a fire escape plan and be sure to practice, practice and practice!

EMERGENCY PLANNING FOR EXTREME COLD WEATHER

Prepare Your Home and Car for Winter At Home:

- Have alternate means of heating with sufficient fuel, such as a wood or propane furnace, or a kerosene heater. Ensure alternative source of heat is approved for indoor use
- Generator with several days' worth of fuel (Caution: generators produce toxic gases such as carbon monoxide. These should only be used outdoors where fumes may be vented safely.)
- Electric space heaters with automatic shut-off and non-glowing elements(to reduce the risk of fire)
- Blankets

In the Car:

- Travel with a mobile phone
- Blankets and other warm clothing (gloves, toques, jacket) – never rely on a car for heat since it may break down
- First aid kit
- Signaling device, such as road flares
- Booster cables
- Toolkit
- Bag of sand (to pour on ice or snow for added traction)
- Tow rope
- Collapsible shovel
- Flash light and spare batteries
- Candles and matches
- Brightly colored clothes
- Container of water and high energy bars
- Windshield scraper

- Road closures
- Winter road conditions
- Construction projects

How to access Ontario 511

Just dial 511. Call to check the roads before setting out on a trip. If calling 511 while driving, observe Ontario's ban on cell phone use while driving. Pull over safely to the road shoulder before calling or use handsfree, Bluetooth technology.

- Zero-out to an agent from Monday-Friday, 8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.
- Access to 511 from other jurisdictions, such as 511 Quebec, 511 NY

Ontario 511 Technology

The 511 telephone service uses voice recognition and text-to-speech technologies to give road information in audio format. Since information is pulled from a variety of databases, you will hear different voice recordings on 511.



- Please place paper and fibres under the grey lid and containers (#1 and #2) «steel cans, aluminum cans, glass bottles & jars» under the blue lid.
- Please read markings on top of the lids and make sure product is placed in the correct compartments. If the product is mixed the cart will be rejected.
 - 3. Cut and «bundle with tape or string» large quantities of cardboard into bundles 2' by 2' by 1' and place them beside the cart.

Absolutely no large cardboard is to be placed in the cart as it will cause a jam.

When does my cart need to be at the curb?

- 4. Place the cart out before **Z:30 AM** on your pick up day.
 - Where should my cart be placed?
- The cart should be at the curb in a location that is free from all obstructions. . ت

Place the cart at least 1 metre (3 feet) from any obstructions. The cart must not be placed behind parked cars.

How should I position my cart?

- The top of the cart lids indicate which way the cart should face. For the cart to be automatically picked up they must face the proper way or they may be rejected. (Cart Handle and wheels need to face the residence). Ġ,
