CAO/TREASURER REPORT

Well, it is official! The new Prince Township Festival and Events Pavilion will be under construction this summer. We have been granted funding from the Federal Government and are awaiting an announcement from our Provincial application, but are proceeding with the planning. Tulloch Engineering was successful in their tender for the engineering services for the project. The Township is looking forward to hosting a local farmers market, offering a covered ice surface in the winter months and a venue for a variety of activities.

As a result of the approval of the funding for this project, Council has suspended the operation of the Summer Day Camp for 2017. With the concern for the safety of the participants, both the children and the counsellors, Council and Staff felt that this was the best option.

As you know, it is Canada's 150th birthday and the 120th birthday for Prince Township. Keep an eye out for various events that will be happening over the course of the year. One exciting event will be the ribbon cutting at the Grop Cap Marina Park, to officially open the universal access dock at the park. Keep June the 9th open and we will update you with the

times for the celebration. This point is a hub for the TransCanada Trail, the Lake Superior Water Trail, the John Rowswell Hub Trail, and the Lake Huron Bicycle Trail. Thanks to support from the TransCanada Trail, the Lake Superior Water Trail and the Waterfront Regeneration groups, we are developing a beautiful site, with fully accessible amenities for all to enjoy.

The Township is expecting to hire 4 students this summer for our roads crew. If you are interested in working for the municipality this summer, watch the newsletter for our ad, or submit your résumé to the office, expressing your interest.

I'd like to take this opportunity to welcome our new NOHFC intern, Sharmina Yasmin, to Prince Township. She will be working in the office, supporting myself, Lorraine and Council with various tasks and projects over the next year.





Prince Township Public Library Survey Information

Dear Resident(s) of Prince Township,

The Prince Township Public Library Board is seeking your support in planning our Library's future and your input is very important.

Whether you are a patron or not, we appreciate your help to complete and return the survey (on the back of this sheet) by **mid-March**, to the Prince Township Municipal Office, Library or to the Library drop-off box outside the main door. We must consider a non-response as no support, but we hope for your support.

At 30 years, our library is one of the few Ontario libraries operated entirely by volunteers.

- In 2017, our 7 desk volunteers keep our door open 16 hours a week. However, the hours of service depend on volunteers available.
- Our Library CEO receives an honourarium of \$300 per month for 10 months (September –
 June), averaging 16 hours per week which is approximately \$4.69 per hour. She also
 volunteers for two shifts at the desk each week.
- To pay for the CEO's honourarium, Library Board members and the Friends of the Library (all volunteers) sell calendars in the fall and used books in our April Mammoth Book Sale.
- The Friends of the Library apply for a federal grant to hire a student who is supervised by the volunteer CEO for July and August.
- Provincial grants, municipal grants and Friends of the Library cover the purchase of materials (books, tablets, and furniture), operating costs, and licenses.

If you aren't already a patron, drop in for a free library card. And please consider joining our aging volunteers to help us increase our hours of service. Thank you!
